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Vision

We imagine Entry Hill Golf Course as a unique
Sculpture - Nature - Community Park

One that demonstrates how the city is positively addressing the Climate and Nature Emergencies and where we can experience thought provoking art and sculpture in a landscape setting.

We also imagine this new park as a focus for the local communities that provides new access for pedestrians and cyclists across this part of the city through naturalised landscape. It is a special park where we can integrate routes and features to encourage active leisure and play, where we can embed interpretation of the special features of the site and where we can host community and city events.

At the heart of the Park would be a new landmark facility that provides an enhanced café, a flexible use hall and a creative studio space shared by the Avon Wildlife Trust and the House of Imagination for creative learning and making.

We believe the park should have a multifunctional role but within a strong Sculpture/Nature identity defined by the integration of international, national and local profile artworks set within a mosaic of enhanced habitats best suited to this site.

The proposal offers the opportunity to establish a permanent showcase for the importance of the landscape and environment to the future wellbeing and enjoyment of the city, its residents and visitors.

A 'green lung' in the City

Offering over 10 hectares of open green space, the golf course site is a significant area of green space in the city and has the potential to work harder to help tackle the climate and nature emergency.

Through enhanced planting and modification of the habitats, the site could improve its potential for carbon sequestration whilst also contributing to strategic nature conservation projects such as the Nature Recovery Network.

For local people and visitors, the space offers the prospect of access to a unique green space and nature where active and passive recreation can be enjoyed to benefit health and wellbeing.



Site Evolution

A high level review of the site indicates it has always formed an edge to one of the main access routes into the city from the south and has always offered a dramatic view of the city centre as the approach road drops over the lip of the valley. It was developed as a large open stone mine which created the distinctive edge topography. In later years it was a farm and then, we understand, a landfill site.

The landfill was capped and modelled to form the golf course we see today. The photos of the original golf course site demonstrate the dramatic open views the site enjoyed at that time.

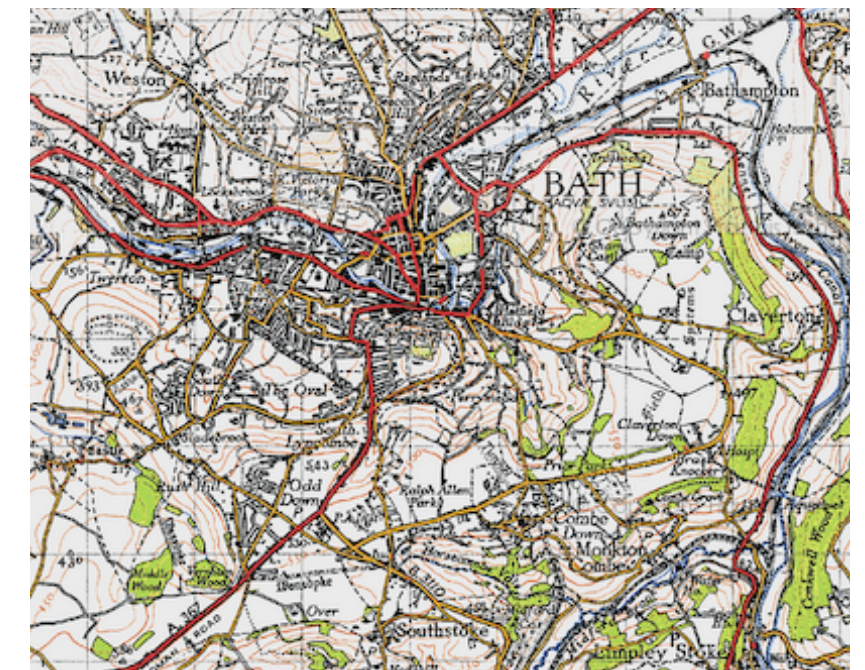

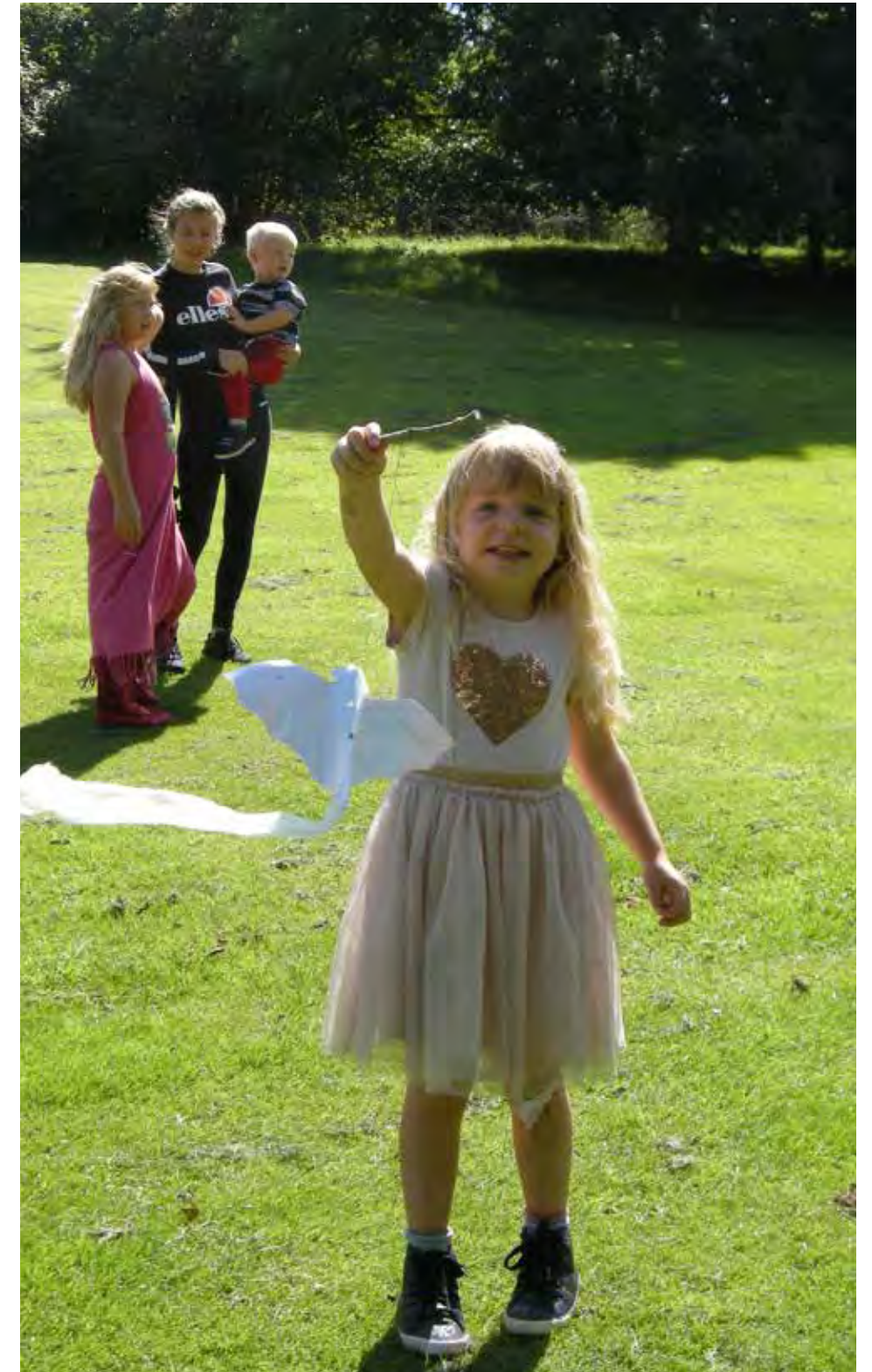

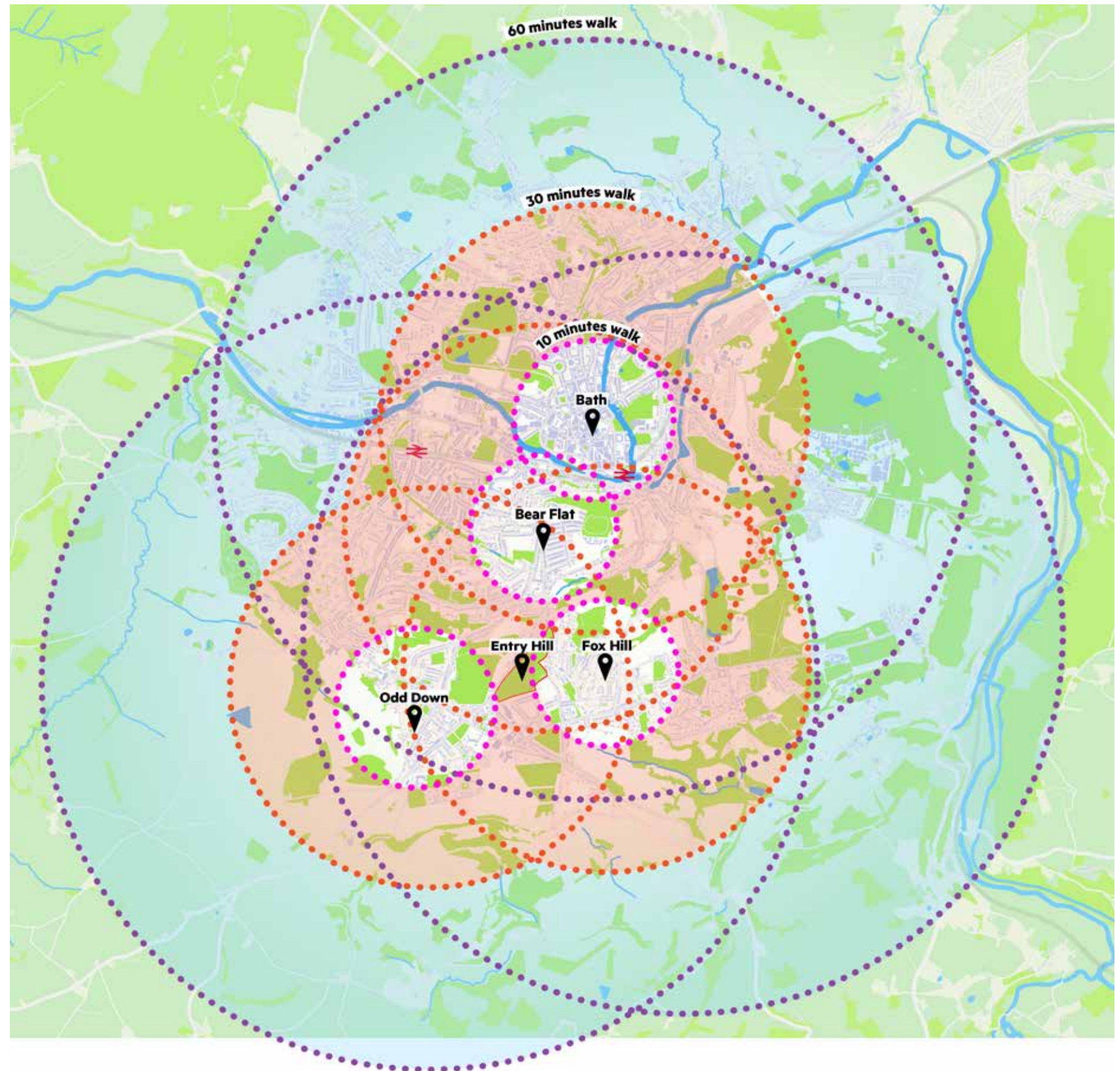
FAMILY NATURE DAY

Community Proximity

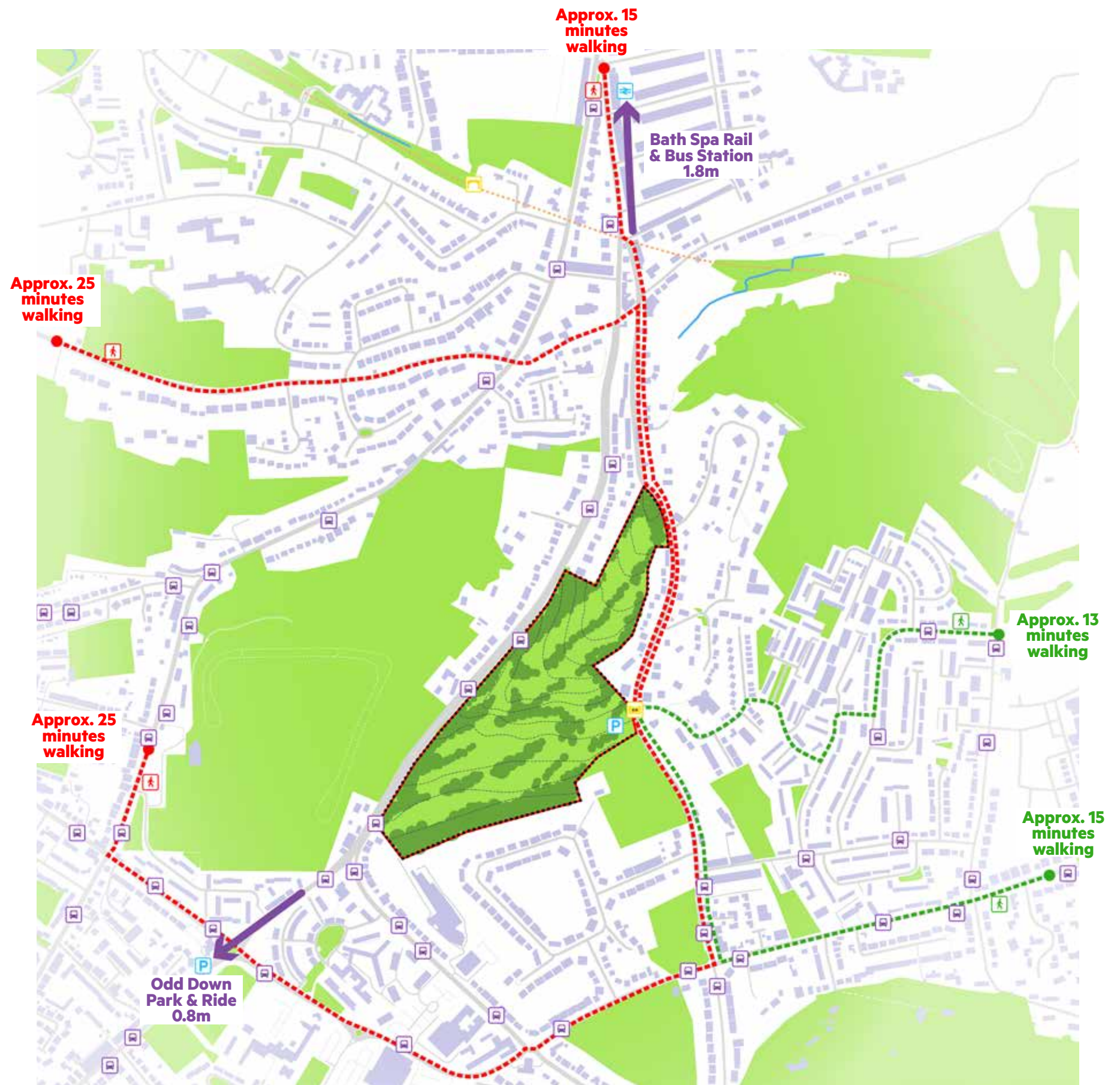
The Foxhill, Odd Down and Bear Flat communities are very close to the site and would benefit greatly from the potential for increased access and activity within the site. It is also within a reasonable distance from the city centre and would be a great asset to attract tourists and visitors out to this part of the city.



Accessibility

The site sits adjacent a major highway and bus route, it has a small car park on site and is lined by pedestrian footpaths that connect with the local communities and the city centre. Access to the popular Two Tunnels route is nearby offering the potential to link into a wider catchment of cyclists and pedestrians.

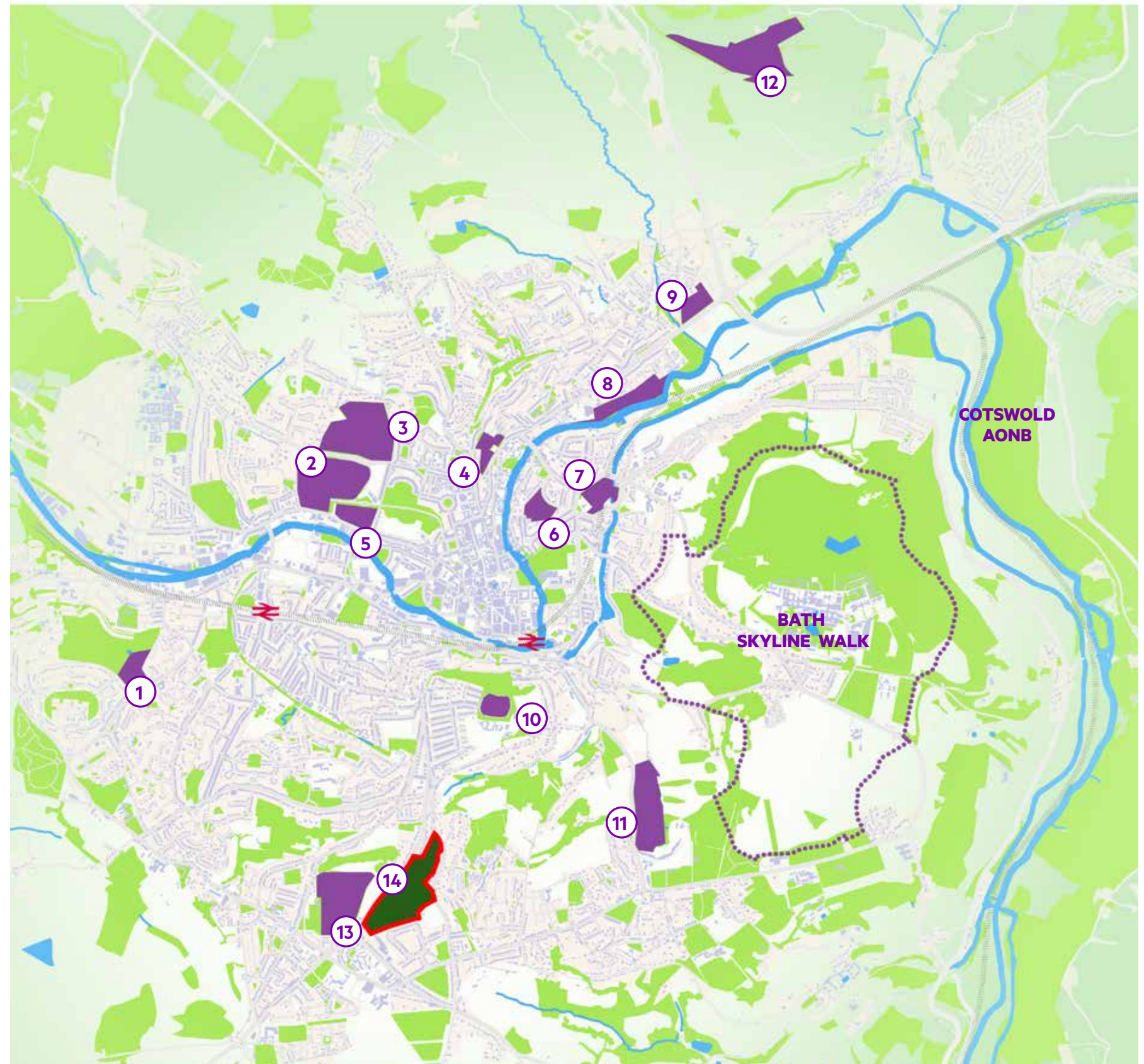

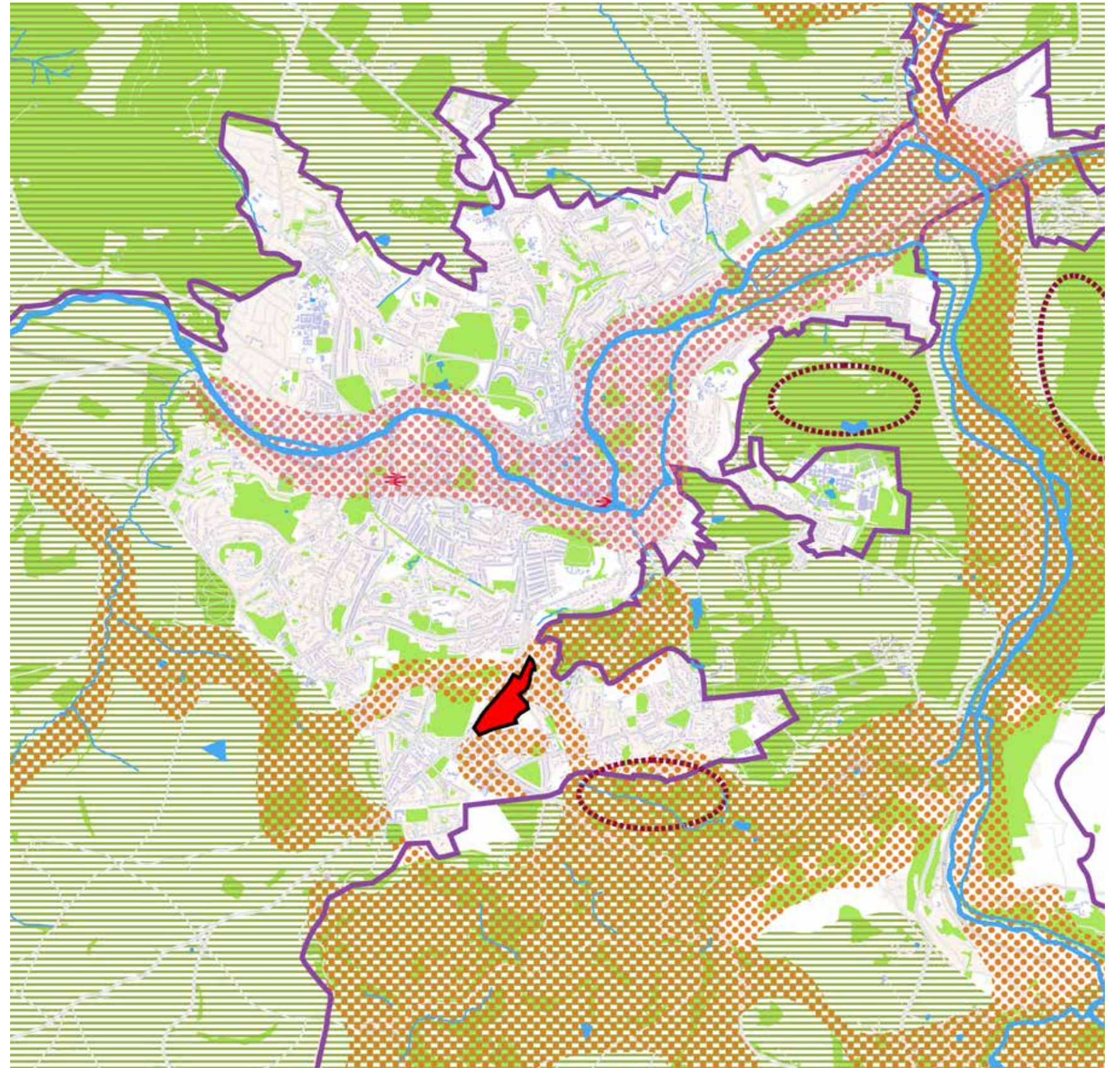

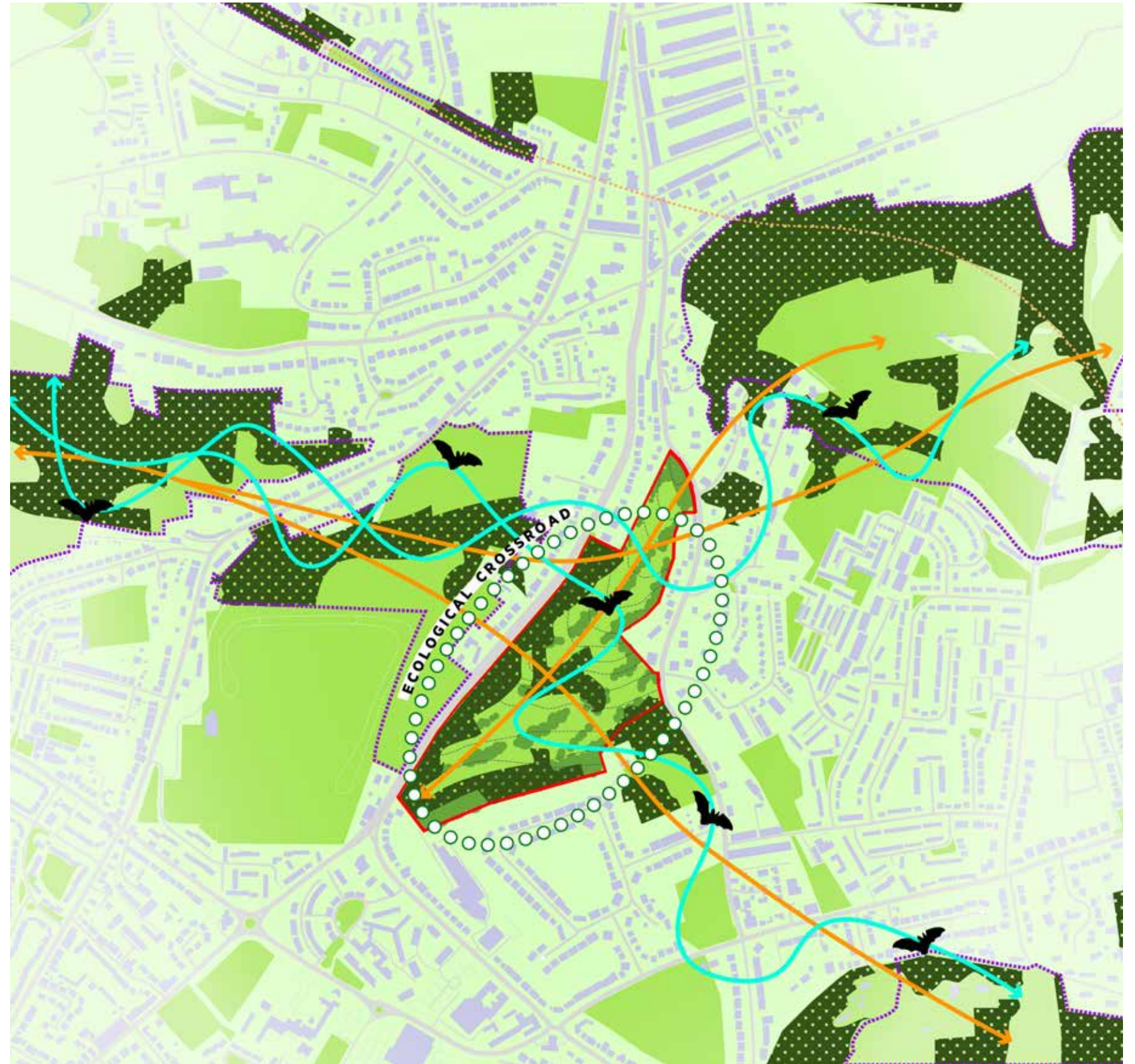

Ecology / Nature

Whilst the site is green and includes a range of trees and understorey it is not especially valuable for its existing ecology. One of its main benefits is as a bat foraging area, especially for the Greater horseshoe bat.

The site is almost entirely screened from its surroundings by the belt of trees along Wellsway and by the mix of properties and trees along Entry hill and other boundaries.

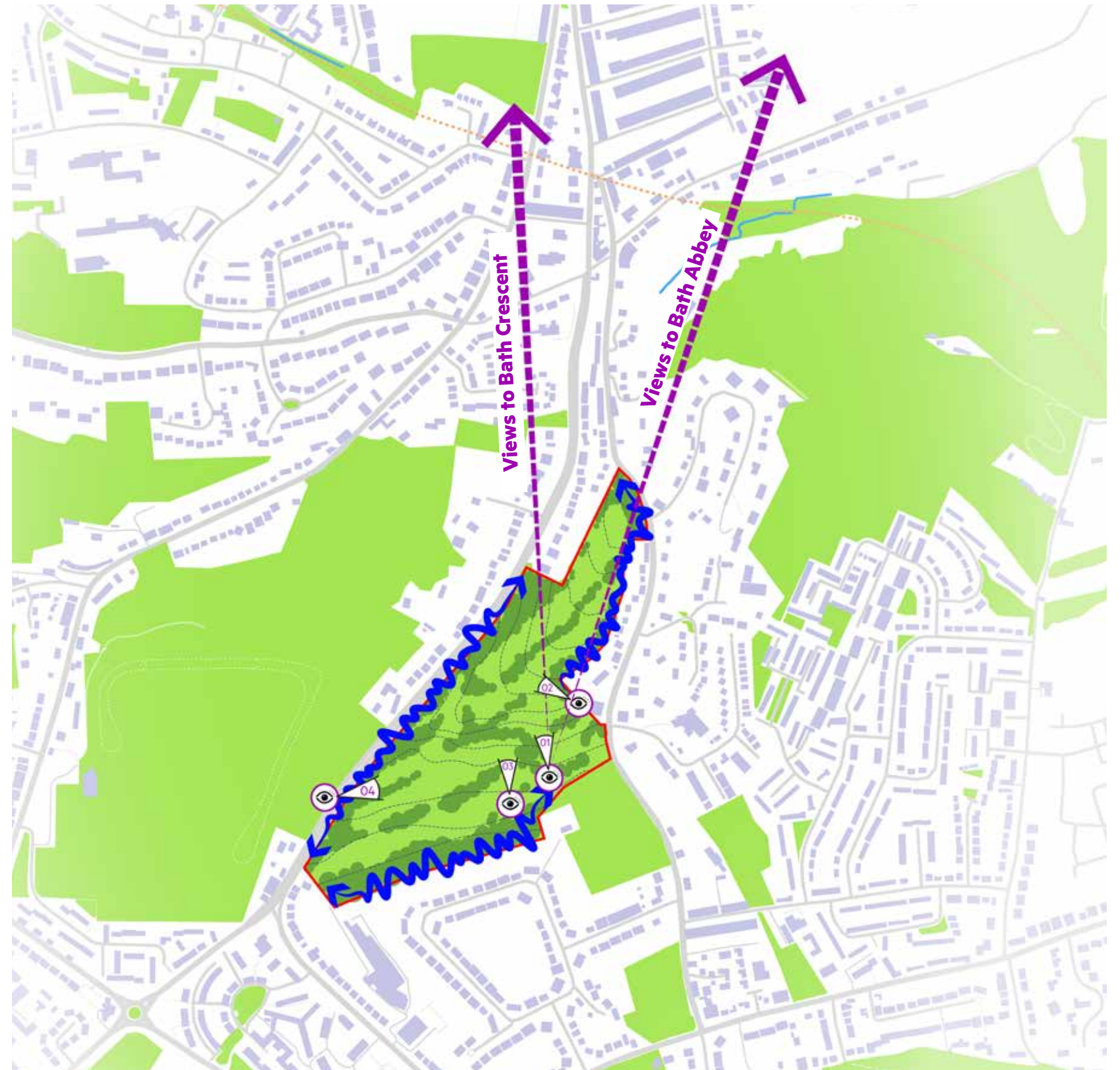
There are dramatic framed views to the city centre from within the site alongside a variety of views across the open fairways and greens.

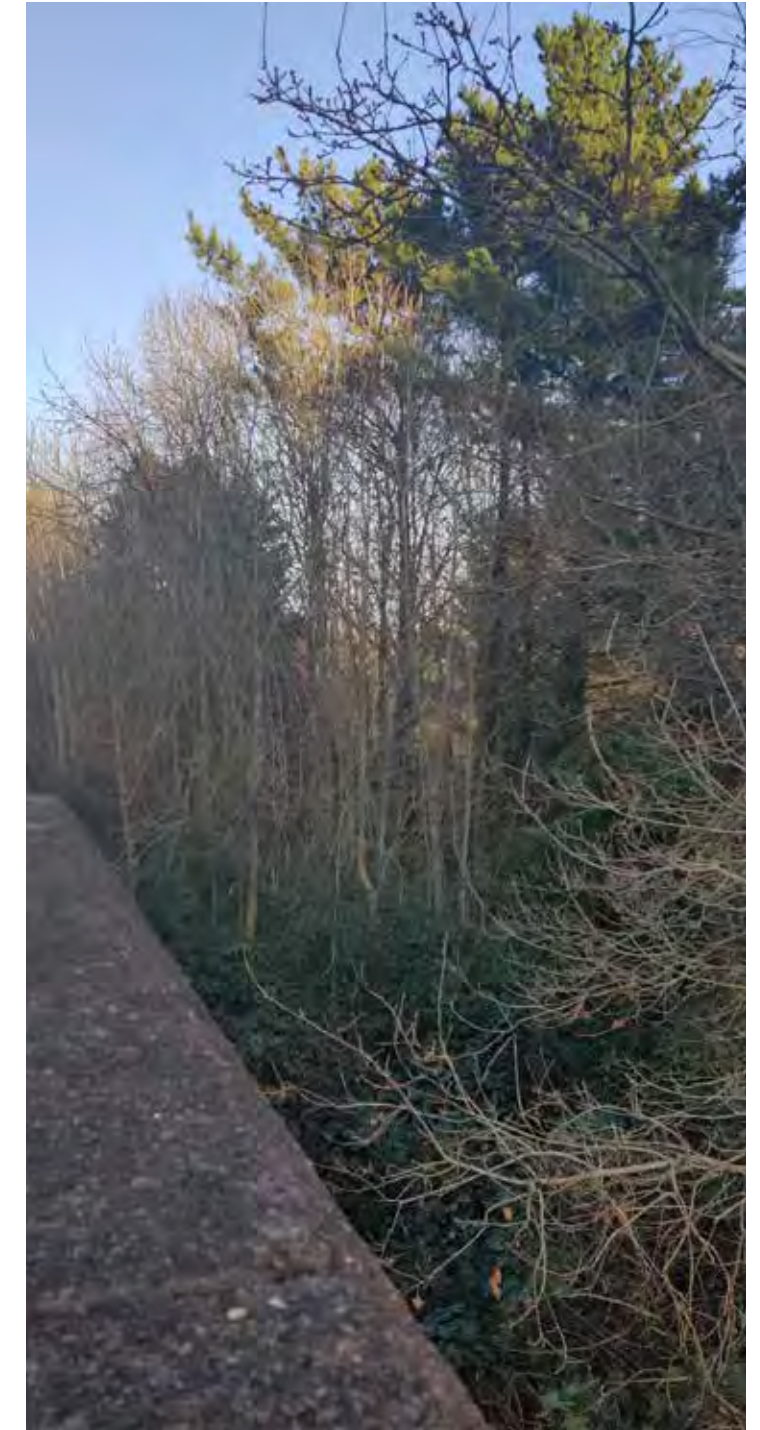

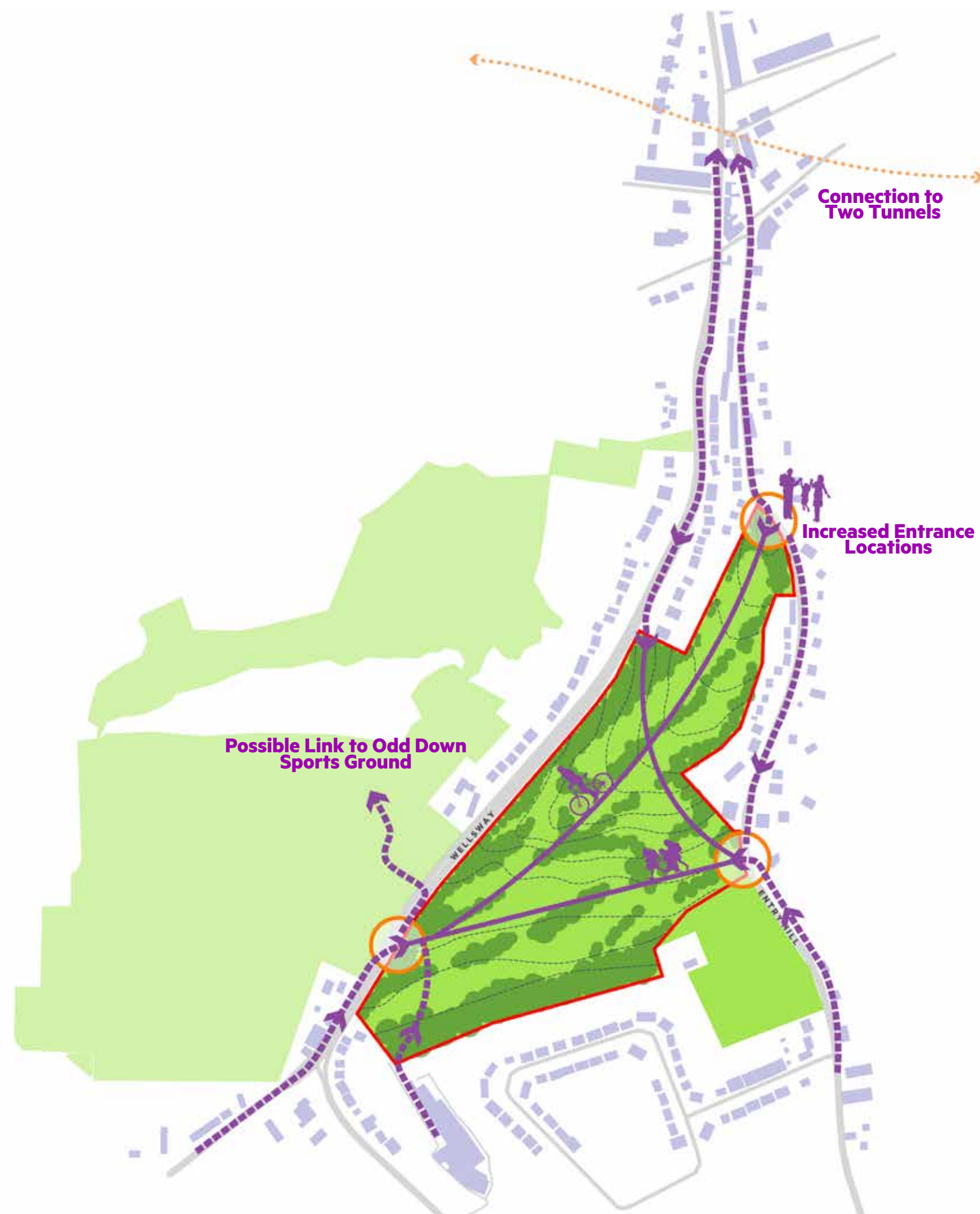

Access & Connectivity

The intention would be to create new routes across the site allowing access from Wellsway to Entry Hill through this green space. These routes would connect with a series of new entrances at the top and bottom of the site and with the existing access point at the upper end of Entry Hill.

The potential to safely connect across Wellsway to the Odd Down Playing fields and The Tumps can be explored, either by a signalised pedestrian crossing or a pedestrian bridge. This would begin to link up the site with a wider network of pathways through Odd Down, Foxhill and to the Two Tunnels route.

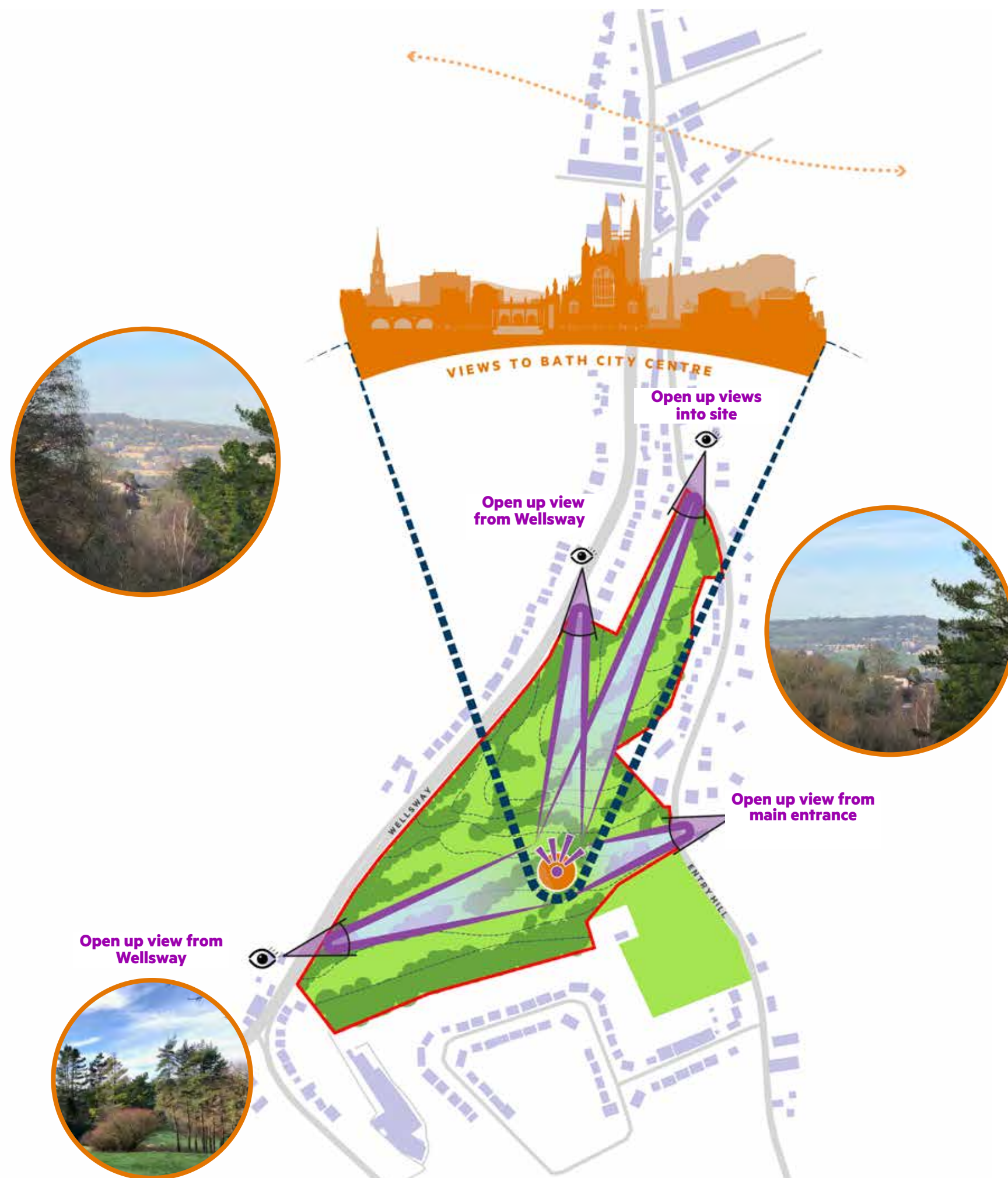
The route connecting the top of Wellsway to the Bottom of Entry Hill should be a shared pedestrian/cycle route with the opportunity for an off route trail for cycles through the tree belt alongside Wellsway.



Open up the Views

The site needs to become more visible and legible in the city. In particular, creating controlled views from Wellsway into and across the site. These views could correspond with new entrances into the site and could focus on a distinctive landmark Sculpture/Building set within the site.

Views from the site to the city centre should also be managed to optimise the drama. Some could be tightly framed glimpses, others should be wider panoramas.



Inclusive Community Spaces & Learning Facilities

House of Imagination and Nature Discovery

The proposal will depend on the development of a new building that offers a flexible venue for the Avon Wildlife Trust, House of Imagination and for community use. The precise scale, form and content of the building will need to be developed but is likely to include a core flexible use space, a café, meeting and studio rooms, gallery, storage, and public toilets.

It has the potential to be a focus for climate and nature initiatives in Bath.

Sculpture / Art in the Landscape

Play in the Landscape

The proposal offers the potential for a unique play offer combining natural play experiences alongside more art based play experiences. A trail of play around the site could be complemented by smaller localised play spaces at the main entrances at the top and bottom of the site.

Wilding the Landscape

The strategy for enhancing the nature conservation value of the site will mainly come through changed management of the existing site to create a richer mosaic of grasslands, tree cover, wetlands and open water. This 'wilding' of the site will be coordinated to deliver a series of accessible and informative learning experiences.

Drainage and Levels

The site offers the potential to include a variety of ponds and wetland habitats subject to the technical constraints on remodelling the land. The site would originally have provided part of the watershed for the Lyncombe Brook and it would be interesting to reflect this connectivity in the designs.

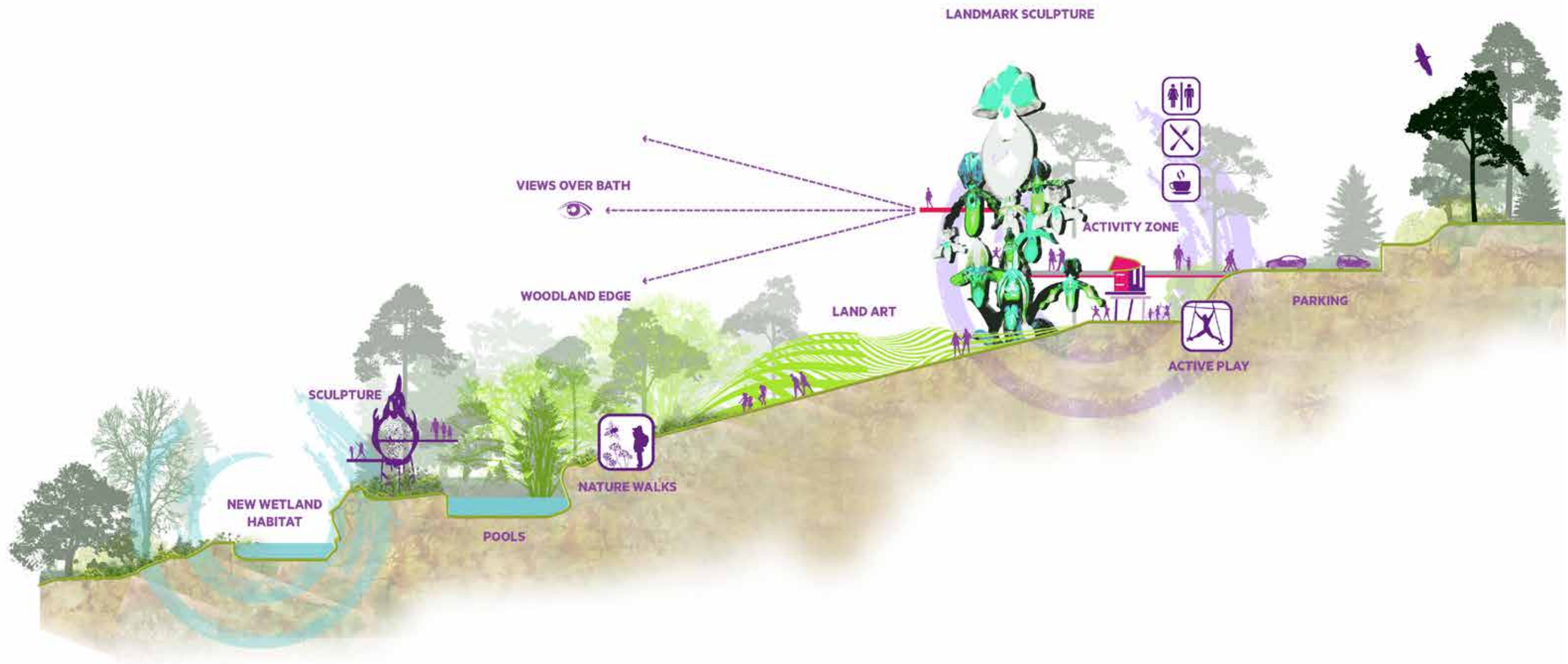


Concept Plan
